Blount Mansion, built in 1792, was the home of the first and only governor of the Southwest Territory, William Blount. The mansion also served as the capitol of the Southwest Territory. As the first frame house west of the Allegheny Mountains, Blount Mansion served as the center for cultural and political life in the Territory. Blount was a signer of the U.S. Constitution and played a pivotal role in Tennessee becoming the sixteenth state. The site is known as the birthplace of Tennessee statehood and is Knox County's only National Historic landmark!
